ELIGIBILITY FOR ENTRY

It should be noted that entries will be strictly confined to the Show Area The show is confined to the area embraced by the former Atholl, Aberfeldy and Killin branches of the National Farmers Union of Scotland. This means that competitors must have a residence within the show area and the animal(s) must be kept within the show area at all times, with the exception of Highland Ponies (Classes 1-12 inclusive) and Clydesdale Horses (Classes 15-23 inclusive) for which entry from outside the area will be by invitation of the committee.

THIS WILL BE STRICTLY ADHERED TO BY THE ORGANISERS AND ENTRIES OUTWITH THE AREA WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED, EITHER ON PAPER OR ON THE DAY.

GUIDELINES FOR HORSE & PONY COMPETITORS

Hard hats should be worn when loading/unloading and **MUST BE WORN** at all times when mounted. Hats must conform to PAS015, ASTM F1163 or EN1384 with a kitemark or SEI.

Extreme care must be used when mounted outside of the competition rings. No cantering.

Control of the Horse or Pony should be maintained at all times.

Competitors will be excluded from taking part in competition if adequate control is not maintained.

Riders must behave in a courteous and safety conscious manner towards officials and spectators at all times.

RULES & REGULATIONS

1. All persons in charge of stock and all persons admitted to the showyard shall be subject to the Rules of the Committee and must obey the orders of the Committee.
2. The Committee reserves the right to refuse any entries it may think fit to exclude, or cancel any entry made, or to prohibit the exhibition of any stock. Entries of stock are accepted only from Members of the Society.
3. Attendants must remain in close attendance of their stock in the showyard.
4. Horse and Pony exhibitors, when showing animals in the judging ring and on parade, must wear number tickets.
5. Admission tickets to showyard will be issued to stock attendants on following basis – Cattle classes – up to six entries, one ticket; over six entries, two tickets. Sheep classes – up to six entries, one ticket; up to ten entries, two tickets; over ten entries, three tickets.
6. In case of inclement weather, the Committee reserves the right to withhold part or the whole of the Show.
7. **No animal may leave the showyard before 4.00pm, unless by permission of the Committee.**
8. The decision of the judges in all cases of dispute shall be final.
9. All animals shown, except where otherwise stated, must be at the time of entry *bona-fide* property of the exhibitor(s) in whose name they are entered, and must have been on the farm(s) from which entered for a period of not less than three months prior to the date of the Show.
10. No animal shall be eligible to compete for a prize or trophy against any other animal which has previously been placed above it in a competition on the same day at the Aberfeldy Show. Any dispute on this point to be referred to the Committee before decision.
11. The Committee will not be responsible for any loss or damage whatsoever and entries are only accepted on this condition.
12. Straw is not permitted in the showyard.

NOTES FOR HORSE & PONY EXHIBITORS: -

Attention is drawn to the “ELEGIBILITY OF ENTRY” paragraph on Page 2.

Passports must be produced when collecting rider numbers.

Guidelines for Turnout in Mountain & Moorland ridden classes: -

- Bridles should be plain and workmanlike.
- Plain browband – metal or clincher are permitted but some judges don’t like them (NB: brass was traditionally for stallions)
- Either no numnah or one which is discreet and matches the horse and saddle
- No boots or bandages
- Brown or black tack – brown is preferred by traditional judges and is always correct in the show ring
- Snaffle bridle for novice classes
- Double bridle or pelham for open classes
- Straight cut or working hunter saddles show more of the horse’s shoulder and movement, so are preferable to GP saddles
- Manes, tails and feathers may be pulled/trimmed in some breeds, according to the breed society’s specifications
- Quarter markers are not correct for native ponies
- In-hand Classes - horses and ponies should be shown in a suitably fitting bridle/headcollar/halter

Hummingbird Cake (Class 24)

FOR THE SPONGE

250g (9oz) self-raising flour	250g (9oz) caster sugar
1 tsp baking powder	1 tsp ground cinnamon
50g (2oz) walnut pieces, chopped	2 large ripe bananas, mashed
1 x 432g tin of pineapple chunks, drained and finely chopped (see tip)	
2 eggs, beaten	1 tsp vanilla extract
175ml (6fl oz) sunflower oil, plus extra for greasing	

FOR THE ICING

100g (4oz) butter, softened	175g (6oz) full-fat cream cheese (see tip)
300g (11oz) icing sugar, sifted	1 tsp vanilla extract

2 x 20cm (8in) round, loose-bottomed sandwich tins.

Preheat the oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6, then grease the tins with a little sunflower oil and line each of the bases with a disc of baking paper.

Measure the flour, sugar, baking powder and cinnamon into a large bowl, add the chopped walnut pieces and stir together. In a separate bowl, mix together the mashed bananas and chopped pineapple with the eggs, vanilla extract and sunflower oil. Add the banana/pineapple mixture to the dry ingredients and stir with a wooden spoon to combine, taking care not to overmix.

Divide the batter evenly between the prepared tins, smoothing the tops with a spoon, and bake in the oven for 25-30 minutes or until golden, well risen and springy to the touch. Set aside to cool down completely before turning out of the tins and peeling off the baking paper.

To make the icing, place the butter in a bowl with the cream cheese, icing sugar and vanilla extract and beat together with an electric hand whisk until smooth. It is best to

beat in the icing sugar a little at a time so that it doesn't fly everywhere. Chill the icing for 30 minutes before assembling the cake.

To assemble the cake, place one cold sponge on a plate and spread with half the icing, then sit the other sponge on top and spread with the remaining icing.
